

Academy Nomination Process

- 1. Send a letter to Congresswoman Van Duyne expressing your desire to attend a United States Service Academy in the spring of your junior year. Please include the following:
 - a. Full Name
 - b. Name of school attending
 - c. Anticipated graduation date
 - d. Contact information (home address, phone, email, etc.)
- 2. The District Office will send out application packages in the spring to be returned to the office no later than **October 15** each year. **Check website for** <u>exact date</u> at <u>https://vanduyne.house.gov/</u>.
- 3. Congresswoman Van Duyne's Academy Selection Board will review all candidate files in October/November to determine which candidates will be interviewed.
- 4. Interviews of selected candidates will be held in November. Congresswoman Van Duyne will make her nominations no later than December 15 each year. Notifications will be made shortly thereafter.
- 5. Since approximately 15,000 students apply each year to attend one of the five military academies and there are only approximately 1,200 slots per Academy, the Congresswoman always encourages you to have a "Plan B." It is essential to look at the various ROTC programs/scholarships available. If you truly desire to be a military officer, we encourage you to apply through some of these sources at the same time.

- 6. Each of the academies offers summer programs you can attend the summer following your junior year. This gives you a taste of what academy life is really like. Since many hundreds apply for the limited slots, it is imperative that you sign up for these sessions as soon as possible. Applications are available online at each of the academies and generally open in January of your junior year. Check the websites at each individual academy for details and exact dates.
- 7. STAY IN SHAPE. We cannot emphasize enough how important this is. If you do not participate in some kind of team or individual sport, you need to work with a trainer to develop a workout plan to ensure you can pass the physical test that is required of all applicants. Run, run and run some more. You need to be in top physical shape in order to get the most out of the training you have to take the first summer at an academy.
- 8. Begin taking the ACT/SAT early and often. These test scores are immensely important and gives our Board and the academies a first glance of your academics. It usually takes more than one time to get a score you will be happy with. In addition, our office requires OFFICIAL scores, meaning they must come directly from SAT/ACT or be reported on an OFFICIAL high school transcript. We will not accept copies, print screens or anything other than the two previous mentioned methods. Therefore, if you wait until the fall of your senior year to begin take the ACT or SAT, you will run a high risk of not being able to get an OFFICIAL score to our office by our deadline in October. We are happy to update your file if you have improved scores in the fall, but only IF we have an official score on file for you by the application deadline.

Eligibility Requirements

To qualify for appointment consideration, you must:

- Be at least 17 years old by July 1 of the year you enter the Academy
- Not have passed your 23rd birthday on July 1 of the year you enter the Academy
- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be of high moral character
- Meet high leadership, academic, physical, and medical standards
- Be unmarried, with no dependents

Academic Performance

Academic performance is based upon grades in high school and any college courses taken, rank in class, and college admission test scores. Math portions of ACT/SAT count more heavily than English. Extra credit is given for honors and AP courses.

Note: We suggest taking the SAT or ACT as many times as possible. To report your scores to our office, use **SAT Code: 4441 or ACT Code: 7705.**

ACT Test Dates 203

June 10, 2023 July 15, 2023 September 9, 2023* October 28, 2023*

Academic Criteria for Service Academies

Minimum SAT scores for the academies: 500 verbal and 500 math

Average SAT scores at the academies are 540 - 620 verbal and 630 - 710 math

Minimum ACT scores for the academies: 21 English, 19 Social Studies, 24 Math, 24 Natural Science

Average ACT scores are 23 – 27 English; 24 – 29 Social Studies; 27 – 32 Math; 28 – 32 Natural Science

*Minimum and average scores are slightly higher for the Naval Academy.
